I'd like to invite you to the 2020 Annual Meeting of the Colorado/Wyoming Chapter of the American Fisheries Society in Laramie, Wyoming February 25-27, 2020. The meeting will be held at the University of Wyoming Conference Center adjacent to the Hilton Garden Inn. Two continuing education courses are being offered on Tuesday, including a course on Ecological Sampling and Study Design provided by West Inc., and Project Wild, an environmental education program, provided by WGFD's Lucy Diggins-Wold. Space is limited in both continuing education programs, so sign up soon!



An evening welcome reception will be held Tuesday Evening in the Legacy Hall at the University of Wyoming Gateway Center. Presentations at this year's meeting will kick off with a plenary session that addresses one of AFS President, Scott Bonar's primary initiatives, to increase the Society's engagement in climate change. This year's meeting will contain several mini symposia with topics including: Aquaculture, Aquatic Invasive Species, Shallow Eutrophic Trout Fisheries, and Implementing Chemical Reclamation/Restoration projects. Presentations will continue on Wednesday and Thursday with a Poster Session on Wednesday afternoon.

As in past years, we are soliciting both informational and scientific presentations in our standard 20-minute time slots, but we are also soliciting presentations for 10-minute time slots. If you feel you don't have enough material for a full 20 minute slot or you'd like to challenge yourself with a lighting talk, perhaps a 10-minute slot is for you. We are also looking forward to a full slate of presentations and posters that cover a wide array of topics. Whether you are a fish culturist, management biologist, habitat biologist, administrator, or researcher, there should be something of interest to everyone. The student hosted social will be Wednesday evening, business lunch on Thursday, and the awards banquet and raffle on Thursday evening.

Oral presentation guidelines: There are two options for oral presentations this year. There will be the standard 20 minute time slot and a short talk slot of 10 minutes. Please limit your presentation to less than the time slot to allow time for questions. Presentations should be in 4:3 format for optimal viewing.

Poster presentation guidelines: Please restrict your poster to a maximum size of 3' high (0.92 m) x 4' wide (1.22 m) and have a smooth finish. We will have display boards and stands, but you are responsible for providing your own form of attachment to attach your poster to the poster board. You are also welcome to bring your own display boards and stands. Please contact us for further guidelines if needed.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

Exciting Continuing Education Classes will be Offered at the 2020 Meeting in Laramie Organized by Diana Miller and Dan Kowalski

Continuing education classes at this year's meeting will offer something to chapter members interested in both the scientific and educational aspects of fisheries biology. There will be two course offered: a half day class on ecological sampling and study design and a full day workshop on Project Wild.

The ecological sampling and study design class will be taught by Dr. Jason Carlisle, Research Biometrician for Western EcoSystems Technology, Inc. The class will be from 1-5 PM on Tuesday February 25th and will be limited to 40 participants.

The overriding purpose of ecological sampling is to design a data-collection effort that will allow analyses that satisfy the objectives of a particular study or monitoring program. Therefore, a good sampling design is prerequisite for a good analysis and for management based on good science.

Many methods in the traditional sampling toolbox were formulated in scientific disciplines that enjoy access to experimentally controlled study systems with clearly defined populations and sample units. Such textbook cases are uncommon in applied ecological science, and practitioners are often compelled to use observational methods of sampling that necessitate alternative approaches.

This workshop will encourage scientists to consider three study design components and give practical suggestions related to each: the spatial design, the temporal design, and the site design. It will emphasize the spatial design component, presenting recent developments in spatially balanced sampling algorithms and demonstrating their ease of application using the SDraw package in Program R. The workshop will include exercises and examples using the free and open-source Program R. While not required, participants are encouraged to bring a computer (with software-installation permissions) to participate in these hands-on exercises.

The second continuing education course will focus on training scientists to communicate with and educate children on aspects of fisheries biology in a fun and effective manner. It will be taught by Lucy Diggins-Wold the Green River Information and Education Specialist with Wyoming Game and Fish. The class will be from 8 AM-5 PM on Tuesday February 25th and will be limited to 50 participants.

Have you ever been asked to work with schoolchildren that come to your office or you are on a field trip with them and you are trying to explain important fisheries concepts and have fun at the same time? Well, whether you have one day or one hour to prepare, Project WILD is for you!

Project WILD is an international, interdisciplinary conservation and environmental education program emphasizing wildlife. Project WILD helps students of any age in developing awareness, knowledge, skills, and commitment to result in informed decisions, responsible behavior, and constructive actions concerning wildlife and the environment.

Water in all its forms is one of the most dramatic of today's arenas in which informed, responsible, and constructive actions are needed. The Aquatic WILD K-12 Curriculum & Activity Guide uses the simple, successful format of Project WILD activities and professional training workshops, but with an emphasis on aquatic wildlife and aquatic ecology. This 8-hour workshop (including one hour for lunch) will introduce participants to some of the activities in the Aquatic Activity Guide, using indoor and outdoor activities, so please dress appropriately!

WELCOME OUR NEW SECRETARY-TREASURER!

ASHLEY FICKE

I spent the majority of my childhood in urban Southern California, where a lot of the rivers are paved. It never felt like home. My fond memories of California involve the time we spent away from home, outdoors, and doing things like snorkeling, hiking, skiing, or fishing. Perhaps that's why I was having second thoughts about my career in the mid-nineties as an undergraduate at UC Davis in California. I was heading towards veterinary school, but I realized that small animal veterinarians worked inside. And I began to understand that a career in natural resources would be a lot more fulfilling than being a DVM.

That first ichthyology course changed everything. Until then, I didn't realize it was possible to study fish for a living, but I had always been keenly interested in them, regardless of their size or economic importance. So, fisheries biology it was! I graduated in 1996 with a BS in Fisheries and Wildlife Biology. I moved to Colorado shortly afterwards and spent a somewhat lengthy "sabbatical" in northwest Colorado, spending winters as a ski bum and doing forestry work in the summer. My first fisheries-related job was for the US Forest Service – we spent summers surveying existing and potential Cutthroat Trout streams as part of an effort to prioritize them for reclamation/Brook Trout removal. In 2003, I was fortunate enough to reunite with some colleagues from UC Davis, at which point I began a MS Degree at Colorado State University. It didn't take long for me to become "hooked" on efforts to improve fish passage and opportunities to work with native Great Plains fishes.

After receiving my MS Degree, I was hired by GEI Consultants, an engineering firm with an ecology branch. In 2009, I began pursuing a PhD, also at Colorado State University, but "forgot" to relinquish my position as fisheries ecologist at GEI. A few extraordinarily entertaining years later, I received my PhD.

It's been almost 13 years, and I'm still at GEI. I enjoy working in a wide range of systems (seven states last year!) and the diversity of the work, which ranges from bioassessment to fish passage. However, by far the best part of my career is talking to engineers about fish. I've been working with engineers on fish passage and stream restoration projects for six years now.

As a "late bloomer" in the fisheries world, my involvement with AFS didn't begin until I was working for the U.S. Forest Service, but I have been a sustaining member since then. While in graduate school, I enjoyed attending/presenting at the student chapter meetings and the Colorado-Wyoming Chapter meetings. I attend our chapter meetings annually, and always look forward to learning about the new and awesome projects our chapter members are working on and to reconnecting with friends and colleagues.

I have been on the environmental policy committee for almost two years and have enjoyed helping draft chapter position letters on issues like the revision of the WOTUS rule and trying to garner support for legislation that helps fisheries. I am currently planning on contacting one of the co-authors of Recovering America's Wildlife Act to see what we can do in this region to help work towards a successful transition from bill to law. I was thrilled to receive the nomination for Secretary -Treasurer for the Colorado/Wyoming Chapter. The only reason I haven't helped more over the years is because I hadn't been asked until now – I would love to be more engaged on behalf of our Chapter, which is so crucial to our careers and to fisheries management and research in this region. I really look forward to serving the members of Colorado/Wyoming AFS in the coming years!
