

### 1991 Minutes Florida Chapter of American Fisheries Society

The meeting was called to order at 2000 hrs by Wes Porak, acting for President Ken Haddad, who was unable to attend. Over fifty members were present. Ron Brockmeyer and Doug Scheidt were present acting for Secretary-Treasurer Grant Gilmore, who was also unable to attend. Past-Presidents Marty Hale, Vince Williams and Bill Seaman; and Paul Brouha, Executive Director of AFS, were introduced. Paul addressed the membership about the history of AFS; how much the society has grown; and the importance of the state chapters. He mentioned how well the Florida Chapter has done in the 11 yrs that it has existed, especially with the publication of the book. He mentioned that the Florida Chapter was nominated by the S.E. Division EXCOMM for the outstanding chapter award. He also asked the Chapter to develop a Action Agenda to focus on problems that the chapter feels need attention.

Marty Hale, S.E. Division's Secretary-Treasurer announced that the next meeting of the S.E. Division would take place in Sulphur Spring, W.V. in November. At last week's mid-term meeting in Charlotte N.C., the S.E. Division voted \$500 for the Permanent Home Fund, \$200 for the Student Fund and \$1500 for a Student Scholarship Fund, which includes travel funds for students attending National or S.E. Division meetings. Marty also mentioned our nomination for outstanding chapter, which resulted from a runoff election among our Chapter and the Texas Tech, Arkansas, and Tidewater Chapters. This gives our Chapter the opportunity to compete for the national award.

Bill Loftus discussed the Nominating and Election Committee procedures and then opened the floor for nominations for officers. Paul Shafland was nominated for President; Chuck Cichra and Ron Taylor for President-elect and Sam McKinny and Ron Brockmeyer for Secretary-Treasurer. The nominations were closed and ballots were distributed. The election results were:

President - Paul Shafland President-Elect - Ron Taylor Secretary-Treasurer - Ron Brockmeyer

The 1990 minutes were read by Doug Scheidt and were approved. Wes then distributed a letter from Ken Haddad to all members. The Treasurer's Report was read by Ron Brockmeyer (copy attached).

The following committee reports were submitted:

Membership Committee: Dave Clapp talked about the membership directory that will soon be ready for distribution. Dave also asked for a member from each of the various institutions and organizations (University, State, Federal or Private) to submit a brief description for inclusion in the directory.

<u>Legislative Committee</u>: Wes commented on some of the items discussed at last year's meeting, including the Chapter's vote to endorse saving Wild and Scenic Rivers. The by-law changes will be addressed next year. Vince Williams discussed this year's issues and stated that the only bill the committee recommends to be endorsed is Bill #H93 or S-140. This bill would

### Florida LAKEWATCH

The Florida LAKEWATCH Program enables lake residents to establish a long-term database for their lakes. The Program facilitates the cooperation of volunteer citizen lake monitors and the academic resources of the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (IFAS) at the University of Florida. The volunteers are trained to take water samples and data every month on their lakes; and Dr. Daniel Canfield, Professor of Limnology at the University of Florida and Director of Florida LAKEWATCH, supervises the chemical analysis, computerization, and analysis of the data. In this way, an historical record of a lake's water chemistry can be documented.

The Florida LAKEWATCH Program has been greeted enthusiastically by volunteers all over the State. By the end of 1991, 397 lakes will be enrolled. There are many more lakes on the waiting list, hoping for increased funding for the Program's further expansion.

The Florida LAKEWATCH Program has spread to over 40 counties. It has received support from the City of Orlando, the City of Winter Haven, and many other concerned citizen groups, local parks, and regulatory agencies. Since April of 1991 there have been 149 training sessions held around Florida in which 265 volunteers have been trained. There have also been 102 meetings with citizens to report on results and/or ongoing situations. An additional battery of water chemistry tests was done on 148 lakes and a macrophyte survey was completed on 22 lakes as part of the Program.

Of interest to the scientific community, the laboratory method used in the Florida LAKEWATCH Program to measure total nitrogen in lake water samples was tested at the University of Florida and approved by the Department of Environmental Regulation in July, 1991.

Of course, the highlight of the LAKEWATCH Program for 1991 was the picnic at the home of Dr. Daniel Canfield in Gainesville which was attended by over 80 volunteers and interested folks. With the help of our enthusaistic and dedicated volunteers, we are looking forward to as productive a year in 1992!



hosted the meeting concerning the fact that nearly 400 feet of shoreline had recently been cleared of brush and suggested that desirable native aquatic plants be replanted on the lakefront. Danon's company, Shorelines, Inc., of Lakeland spent two days collecting and transplanting the needed vegetation and donated the cost of the project to FLMS in order to defray the annual meeting expenses.

William "Buck" Wegener was presented with the 1991 Service in Government Award. This award is presented annually to a government employee working in water resources or associated fields. The recipient must have shown a career-long commitment to quality resource management, and be recognized by his or her peers as having made contributions above and beyond those normally expected from a government employee. Buck has been employed by the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission for the past twenty-eight years and is currently the Statewide Fishery Management Coordinator and is responsible for the Boat Ramp and Fish Attractor Construction Program. He has won numerous awards for his pioneering work in lake restoration. For three consecutive years (1972-74), Buck co-authored technical publications which were recognized as outstanding papers by the Southern Division of AFS. No other author in the history of the Southern Division has come close to duplicating this. His peers recognize him as an outstanding motivator, and a leader who can always be counted on to develop each individual's talents to the utmost.

As members of the Florida Chapter we should be proud of these three individuals. Keep up the good work!

### COMMITTEE REPORTS:

### Urban Fisheries:

An urban fisheries committee has been formed within the Florida Chapter of the American Fisheries Society. The purpose of this committee is to promote the exchange of information about urban fisheries — both fresh and salt water. Urban fisheries research and management is expanding nationwide and will be an important part of Florida's fisheries future.

By-Law Committee: The terms of officers will be switched to February - February.

Awards Committee: Chuck Cichra discussed the student travel awards; 5 of which were granted this year. A Certificate of Appreciation was awarded to Anna Avrigian at National Marine Fisheries Service, who assisted Churchill Grimes. A belated Honorable Mention was given to Jerry Krumrich for a talk given last year.

<u>Book Committee</u>: Doug Scheidt reported that \$5,100 was made on book sales last year. This included money from the Navigating the 90's conference.

OLD BUSINESS: None.

### **NEW BUSINESS:**

Paul Brouha asked the Chapter if they would be interested in hosting the 1995 National meetings. He stated that it would be beneficial for the chapter and could be profitable; it would also be lots of work with possibly 2 yrs commitment. Wes asked who takes charge, the Chapter, a state or federal agency, or combination of these? Paul said that any of these could and then submitted a list of guidelines for hosting meetings. The deadline for proposals is 1 Aug, 1991. Randy Edwards suggested that Ken and Wes approach their agencies. Bill Seaman suggested a straw vote of those present to determine membership interest. Paul Shafland made a motion to establish a feasibilty committee consisting of the Past-Presidents. The motion was seconded and unanimously passed.

It was mentioned that Grant Gilmore suggested that we form a Technical committees to deal with different issues.

The Presidency was handed over to Paul Shafland and Paul made a few commments and discussed goals: to form a Technical Committee to establish positions on aquaculture, commerical fishing, sport fishing, grass carp, the Everglades, etc.; and to develop a comprehensive environmental position statement.

Ed Joyce mentioned that Ken Haddad suggested in his letter that we donate \$300 to the AFS Permanent Home Fund. It was moved that we donate \$500 instead, since we have sufficient funds. The donations would be made as a tribute to Carl Sullivan on his pending retirement, in recognition of his selfless dedication to the Society and to the fisheries profession. Motion passed.

Excom Meeting Minutes 9 April 1991

The meeting was opened by the president at 1:30 pm and followed the agenda prepared by the president. The meeting was attended by Paul Shafland, Ron Taylor, Ken Haddad, and Ron Brockmeyer.

1. Secretary/Treasurer: A draft copy of the minutes of the annual chapter meeting was distributed for review by the EXCOM.

A discussion of the chapter's finances followed and concluded that a thorough review of the books was appropriate. A target date of the end of the month was proposed. The possibility of a general audit was also discussed. It was suggested that the national society be contacted for information on possible investment options and procedures.

2. President: Correspondence from the president, including letters in support of Legislative committee positions, was discussed.

A progress report on the filling of committee chairmanships was given (see attached President's Message). A discussion followed regarding the procedures for technical committee oversight. It was concluded that an emphasis on communication could insure a positive program. It was suggested that close interaction between the legislative committee and the technical committees would facilitate an informed, responsible legislative agenda.

It was suggested that the presidents plaque be ordered so that it would arrive in time for the meeting in February.

A proposal was made that the chapter sponsor a series of seminars and continuing education programs (i.e. fishing clinics) drawing on the expertise of the chapter membership.

It was proposed that all members strive for professionalism in their work especially where it has an impact on the chapter's reputation.

A goal was set to have the chapter host the 1992 Southern Division and National EXCOM meetings.

The attached President's Message, which was prepared for publication in the Shell Cracker, was circulated and discussed.

3. 1992 Program Chair: A theme of "The Future of Florida's Gamefish" was proposed and discussed. It was generally agreed that this was an appropriate and timely subject for a chapter meeting. The format would call for a session of invited speakers on the morning of the first full day of the meeting. These speakers would be leaders in their respective fields. Some possible candidates for this session were discussed. The afternoon session on that day would feature contributed papers related to the theme. The third session would contain any contributed papers on any topic related to fisheries in general.

It was suggested that on the afternoon or evening of registration day a leadership seminar sponsored by the National be held for all committee chairpersons, nominated officers and all other interested parties.

A suggestion was made to look at the possibility of including a meeting shirt or hat in the registration price of the meeting.

### 4. Old Business:

- -Call renewed for officers to point out qualified persons for committee membership.
- -A review of the Chapter Procedures Manual should be conducted to keep it current.
- -Chapter members with responsibility should review AFS leadership materials.
- -The 1995 Parent Society Meeting host committee progress was briefly discussed. This discussion also touched on the EXCOM meeting idea.
- -The Withlachochee apology was discussed and action mandated by weeks end.
- -The next annual chapter meeting will occur the second or third week of February.
- -Membership criteria were discussed. Ways are being sought to facilitate and encourage Parent Society membership for chapter members.

### 5. New Business:

- -Formal suggestion made regarding meeting T-shirt/hat.
- -A brief discussion of the concept of a chapter Executive Director took place.
- -The next chapter EXCOM meeting was set for 20 August at 1:30 pm at FMRI in St. Petersburg.
- -Ways of increasing "Book" sales were discussed. A proposal was made to include the book in registration fees charged for meetings sponsored by the chapter. A table at the National meetings was also mentioned.
- -A discussion of future chapter projects included sponsorship of state and regional meetings. The Snook Symposium was mentioned as an event worthy of sponsorship. A Gulf Symposium scheduled for 1992 with Federal and private participation is another possibility.

Meeting was adjourned at 5:30 pm.

### MEMBER NEWS:

The Florida Lake Management Society (FLMS) held their annual conference September 12 and 13, 1991 at the Radison Hotel in Orlando. Three members of the Florida Chapter of the American Fisheries Society were honored with awards. Past Chapter President, Vince Williams, was presented with the Marjorie Harris Carr Award. This award is presented annually to an individual who has made significant lifelong contributions to the management of Florida's aquatic resources. Vince was chosen by the FLMS Board of Directors as the recipient due to his twenty years of service with the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission and his pioneer work in the field of lake restoration. Vince has also been recognized as a widely respected expert in the disciplines of water quality, aquatic habitat improvement, and fisheries management.

Danon Moxley was chosen by the President of FLMS to receive the 1991 President's Award. This award may be presented each year to a member of FLMS who, through their actions, have most benefitted the Society in the previous year.
