

The 2018 annual Chapter meeting was held in St. Cloud on February 6 through 8. Additionally, the Chapter award of excellence has been renamed to honor the late Dennis (Denny) Schupp, a long time DNR fish research biologist who served as a mentor and inspiration to many of us. The Chapter continues to be in a strong financial position.

Planning is underway for a joint meeting with the Dakota Chapter of AFS in Fargo, North Dakota February 25-27, 2019. The Dakota Chapter is composed of fisheries professionals from the states of North and South Dakota. President-Elect, Edie Evarts, and Arrangements Chair extraordinaire, Mandy Erickson, are our leads for organizing this meeting. As always, a variety of volunteers will be needed to organize and pull off the meeting.

Following the rotation called for in the Chapter bylaws, where the Chapter President is a DNR employee on odd years and a non-DNR employee on even years, we will be looking for members who are not employees of the DNR to run for the position of President-Elect before the 2019 annual meeting. We will also need to nominate and elect individuals for the academic and federal slots on the Chapter's Executive Committee.

For the 40 years I've been a member of the national American Fisheries Society, there has often been a question of "What does a person get for their membership in the national AFS or the "parent society"? Now that parent society membership includes online access to AFS journals (Transactions, Journal of Aquatic Animal Health, North American Journal of Fish Management) there is a good answer to that question. Although we will continue to have some "Chapter only" members, we will also encourage membership in the national AFS or "parent society".

Snapshot: 2018 Annual Meeting

On February 6-8, 2018, approximately 130 students and professionals attended the Minnesota Chapter of the American Fisheries Society 51st annual meeting at the Kelly Inn in St. Cloud, MN. The meeting theme was "Communicating Fish Science in Minnesota."

Thanks to members of our Ad-Hops committee, the meeting was kicked off with a welcome reception at Beaver Island Brewery. The venue (and beverages) was the perfect way to kick start information sharing, networking, and collaboration.

Day 1 began with a welcome address from Patrick Schmalz and Paul Glander (currently Past-President and President, respectively). This was followed by two plenary sessions. Julie Defilippi Simpson, AFS Communications Committee Chairperson, gave a presentation titled "To Members...And Beyond! Resources and Strategy for Effective Communications", which outlined AFS communication strategies and tools at the national level. Julie stressed the importance of understanding your audience and providing a consistent message as she states, "it is important to remember your message, know who you are and know who you want to be." Julie's presentation was followed by Dr. Katie Steiger-Meister, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service - External Affairs, who provided a talk titled "Carp-ocalypse Now! Your Survival Guide to Invasive Species." Katie highlighted the communication blunders and successes associated with the Service's Asian Carp management. Katie stressed the importance of timeliness, accuracy, and consistency in messaging.

Over the following day, more than 70 oral and poster presentations were given showcasing the tremendous fisheries conservation work throughout Minnesota.

The oral and poster sessions were followed by the annual Chapter Business Meeting. As evidenced by the perennial low attendance, the time and location of the meeting must be a closely guarded secret. During the Chapter business-meeting, it was announced that Edie Evarts (MN DNR Fisheries, Tower) was elected to be the Chapter's President-Elect. Kristan Maccaroni (MN DNR Fisheries, West Metro) was elected to the Executive Committee slot for DNR employees and Jay Hatch was reelected to the "Open" Executive Committee slot. It was announced at the business meeting that the Chapter award of excellence has been renamed to honor the late Dennis (Denny) Schupp, a long time DNR fisheries research biologist who served as a mentor and inspiration to many of us.

The meeting culminated with an awards banquet honoring member achievements, a presentation from Dakota AFS president-elect Josh Wert, and a most impressive raffle hosted by Bemidji State University Student Sub-Unit that refused to be overshadowed by the chocolate fondue fountain. 2018 Scholarship Recipient

This year's unanimous selection for the E. E. Mecklenburg New Ulm Area Sport Fishermen Scholarship is Linda Xiong. Linda received two checks, one from Ruth Mecklenberg in the amount of \$500 and one from MNAFS in the amount of \$400 for a total of \$900. The Chapter also waived the Annual Meeting registration fee for Linda and covered her lodging costs for two nights. Linda attended the entire meeting and definitely made the most of it.

Biographical Summary of Linda Xiong

Linda is a Senior at the University of Minnesota-Twin Cities majoring in Environmental Sciences, Policy, and Management and minoring in Marine Biology. She is mentored by Dr. Andrew Simons, Jennifer Nicklay, Julie Westerlund, Amy Browender, and Gretchen Bass, to name a few. Linda's application revealed a person not only dedicated to and excited about studying and protecting freshwater and marine ecosystems but also passionate about sharing her knowledge and enthusiasm with others, especially today's youth. Since

ending her freshman year of coursework, Linda has worked as an Intern with Minnesota Department of Natural Resource's (MNDNR) MinnAqua Program, a Technician with Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA); and as a Curatorial Assistant in the Fish Collection of the James Ford Bell Museum of Natural History (University of

Minnesota). She has become quite adept at identifying many of Minnesota's most challenging fish species, acting as a verifier of species collected by both MNDNR and MPCA. She is an experienced fish sampler, having become familiar with most forms of electrofishing, gill netting, trap netting, and seining; a stream macroinvertebrate sampler; and has experience in identifying and measuring stream and lake stressors. Her return to MPCA for a second field season as a Technician and her subsequent MPCA Employee Recognition Award attest to her value as a field biologist. Linda also has conducted research on soil chemistry and its effects on stream water quality.

While interning with MinnAqua, Linda discovered her enthusiasm for teaching "people of all ages." In addition to developing and teaching fishing clinics, Linda shot and produced a video that allowed clinic participants to experience the inner ecosystem of a lake, showing different mesohabitats—physical water characteristics, vegetation types (including invasive versus native) and the fish species found within. She continued her public outreach mission over the past two years by giving volunteer fish talks to the crowds surrounding the DNR Pond at the Minnesota State Fair.

As President of the Marine Biology Club at University of Minnesota, Linda not only discharged the normal duties of that office but also led and supported a variety of outreach events both on campus and [in] elementary schools to encourage young students to pursue postsecondary education, and to start thinking about the natural environment as a career opportunity. "Outreach was my favorite part about being President because I got to meet so many young people. I wanted to have an impact on them through talking about water quality and marine biology to encourage their learning." During a semester at University of Hawaii, Linda volunteered in a bioacoustics laboratory and became a member of the Sea Turtle Stranding Response Team, the experiences from which, she developed an outreach activity for the Marine Biology Club.

Linda has internationalized her environmental management education by studying natural resource sustainability in Ecuador, and environmental management and natural history in Norway. She also works as a Communications and Program Assistant in the study abroad program in the College of Food, Agriculture and Natural Science (CFANS), and volunteers in the College Possible program.

This issue's member spotlight: Dr. Gretchen Hansen, Fisheries Systems Ecologist, Minnesota Department of Natural Resources

Tell me how you first got involved with fisheries?

I grew up in Minneapolis and my family owns a cabin in Northwestern Wisconsin, where we would spend weeks at a time playing in the lake each summer. I always loved water, the outdoors, and biology, so when I learned that you could have a career combining all three I jumped at the chance. I got my first experience in fisheries working at the University of Wisconsin-Madison's Trout Lake Station in Vilas County working on invasive crayfish and food webs, and from there have been lucky enough to work on a variety of species and ecosystems.

What research are you currently working on?

I am working on a number of projects under the broad umbrella of understanding how large scale environmental change affects lakes and lake fish. Specific projects include statistical analyses to describe spatial and temporal patterns in fish relative abundance, food web analysis of Minnesota's large walleye lakes using stable isotopes, and modeling thermaloptical habitat for walleye.

How do you think fisheries conservation will change in the next 10 years?

Fish and fisheries are changing due to unprecedented environmental changes, while at the same time resources to monitor and manage for these changes are more and more limited. The major challenges to our profession in the coming decade will be to identify causes of change in complex systems and to design effective management strategies that account for new conditions while retaining core objectives. I expect that to meet these challenges, fisheries scientists will incorporate new approaches and technologies into time-honored approaches, and that interdisciplinary collaboration will be necessary to be effective.

What is a favorite memory from your field work?

SCUBA diving nearly every day for three summers in Sparkling Lake, Vilas County, Wisconsin. The water is crystal clear and full of beautiful habitat and fish. The smallmouth bass have learned that SCUBA divers provide ample food, so they will follow you around and eat crayfish out of your hand.

What advice would you give to young fisheries professionals?

Focus on developing tools and skills that will be widely marketable and applicable to a variety of jobs. You never know where the next great opportunity will be, so be open to a range of options. Also, develop collaborations with good people with different backgrounds and skills, and strive to be a good collaborator.

In August, Gretchen will be taking a new position as an assistant professor of fish ecology at the Fish, Wildlife, and Conservation Biology Department at the University of Minnesota.





Symposia topics related to the conference theme are highly encouraged, as well as those addressing aspects of fish and wildlife ecology, management, conservation, health, or human dimensions.
