Closing out the plenary was Dr. Melissa Wuellner, assistant professor in the Department of Natural Resource Management at South Dakota State University, and NCD past-president. Her presentation was titled, "Millennials, millennials everywhere".

In addition there were more than 40 oral presentations and 15 posters. Work has begun on the 2017 Action Plan adopted at our annual business meeting. The focus of that plan was communication and committees. So far most of

the standing committee chairs have been filled.

The Chapter has been fortunate to have some dedicated committee chairs that were willing to continue in those positions. In addition, new individuals expressed interest in serving the Chapter on committees. We are still looking for an interested

The Fisheries, Wildlife, and Conservation Club (FWCB) family grew even bigger this past fall with over 70 new members of the new incoming freshman! This past summer we assisted the UMN veterinary students in assessing the health of lakes, near the Boundary Waters and Lake Superior, with various levels of anthropogenic impact. Over 200 plus walleyes and yellow perch were weighed, measured, and sampled for parasites. In the fall, we had several events that occurred ranging from guest speakers, CWD deer hunt check stations, and owl and raptor banding. For guest speakers, we had a few people from MNDNR and other biologists in Minnesota share their experiences in the field. In the month of October, we helped the MNDNR check for CWD around the metro area and various hunting sites throughout Minnesota. Also in the month of October, we banded owls at the Weaver Dunes Field Station and hawks near the Duluth area. Lastly, we are excited about the upcoming events during the winter and spring. Some events we are looking forward to are lynx tracking in Ely and Grand Marais, seine netting at the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge, Saint Croix canoeing, small mammal trapping, and more!

The American Fisheries Society sub-unit at UMD has enjoyed a great semester of activities and hosting local biologists and professors from around the area. Each year, our sub-unit aims to help with a beach cleanup, sponsored by Minnesota Sea Grant, on Park Point in Duluth. This area is a wonderful beach that is used often, and so we always want to do our best to make sure it's clean for everyone to enjoy. We worked with Sea Grant and a local Cub Scouts Troop to help clean up the beach this October, and are pleased to report that the beach was spectacularly clean! Afterwards we enjoyed a cook out and some quality time outdoors. When the UMD sub-unit isn't out volunteering, we enjoy hosting local biologists and professors, to learn more about what they do, and also to learn more about what we can do to get involved. We have so far hosted Dr. Joel Hoffman from the EPA-Mid-continent Ecology Division, Emma Pardini who works as an educator at the Great Lakes Aquarium, and Dr. Bryan Matthias, who is a post-doctoral researcher here at UMD. Doug Jensen from Minnesota Sea Grant will give the final presentation of the semester on invasive species in the Great Lakes. These presenters offered us help and advice from different aspects of the biological field. Emma Pardini helped to demonstrate an educational kit available from the Great Lakes Aquarium, to help with our outreach planned for the spring 2018 semester. Last spring semester the UMD sub-unit volunteered at Myers-Wilkins elementary school in Duluth, where an afterschool club of scientists were taught about the different types of fish that live in Lake Superior. The subunit hopes to repeat this outreach this spring semester. Also planned for the spring 2018 semester is our annual trip to the Great Lakes Aquarium, an ice fishing trip in the Duluth harbor, and a trip to the Lake Superior Estuarium with Deanna Erickson.



UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA DULUTH Driven to Discover

The BSU AFS Subunit has had a plethora of fun and exciting hands-on experiences in the fisheries field. With a resurgence of new students each year, our organization is now at 23 members, and growing. We kicked off the year with a pink salmon trip via rod and reel along the north shore of Lake Superior to aid in our Ichthyology preserved specimen collection. We then continued data collection for our long-term IBI site on Turtle River. The collected fish were counted, identified to their lowest taxonomic level, and then released. This project observes species richness along three sites to aid in undergraduate research. Collected efforts made by the MNDNR gave us another chance this year to PIT-tag juvenile muskellunge for their long-term stocking program throughout Minnesota's northwest region. The staff's knowledge base, hands-on experience, and tour of Bemidji's hatchery was another great investment for our subunit. As winter rolled in, temperatures dropped and Lake Whitefish soon began their spawning run up the Mississippi River. The Power Dam in Beltrami County inhibited further movement, allowing our Subunit a brand new opportunity to collect potential specimens to aid in our Ichthyology collection. Our first outing yielded success with six captured via seine hauls. While the second day proved less successful, a separate group backpack electro-shocked a mixed slough of species including horny head chubs, blacknose dace, and burbot. Last spring we also aided Urbank Bait Co. by netting and stripping male and female white suckers of milt and eggs by means of an extended ¹/₄-inch mesh size seine haul along the Mississippi River. A total of 12 Subunit members joined in this annual weeklong activity, totaling an estimated 14 hauls and handled over 4,000 white suckers.

Throughout 2017, our Subunit was also able to aid in multiple volunteer efforts. Bemidji State's annual 5th grade field trip provided us the opportunity to inform students about overarching themes of aquatic biology, limnology, and fisheries science. We were also fortunate to help give back to the community by volunteering our time to help pick up trash, and other inorganic material along Lake Bemidji's shoreline. Spring of 2018 yields a diverse amount of activities including DNR speakers, a Great Lakes Aquarium field trip, and our very own aquatic biology ice-house for winter research and facilitation of our annual perch ice-fishing tournament fundraiser. As we look forward, Bemidji State Subunit's future is bright and stronger than ever!





NEVER STOP WONDERING AND LEARNING

Member Spotlight

This issue's member spotlight: Neal Mundahl

What is a favorite memory from your field work?

I have two memories that stand out from the others. One occurred back in the mid-1980s when I was teaching a Limnology class in southwestern Ohio. We were on the university pontoon boat on a local reservoir, slowly motoring back to the marina. YOY gizzard shad were everywhere, and they all jumped out of the water in unison whenever a student banged loudly on the boat deck. For some reason, all of the students moved toward the bow at the same time, causing the pontoons to submarine. The pontoons only went down so far before the boat shot upward and backward like a cork popping out of a bottle. No students "went swimming", but they learned a valuable lesson about staying in place while on a moving boat.



The second memory was from a stream electrofishing session within the city limits of Winona during 2006. Three students and I were just finishing up electrofishing the final pool of a stream reach, and had just located a submerged bicycle (too rusted to salvage). The stream suddenly was filled with large, stunned brown trout. We only captured three fish, but two weighed in at 3 pounds and the 3rd weighed > 8 pounds. I had passed by that stream pool thousands of times in the previous 17 years, but never suspected that it held so many big trout. No, I'm not telling anyone where that pool is located!

What advice would you give to young fisheries professionals just getting started?

I would advise that young fisheries professionals take every opportunity to learn from their professional elders. I benefited greatly from my early interactions with renowned biologists in the years prior to their retirement. In particular, I am indebted to Cal Fremling. He got me involved with local lake management and demonstrated how to interact with and unite diverse user groups to work toward a common goal.

In addition, young professionals should continue updating their skill sets (computer software, statistics, writing, speaking) as much as time allows. Young professionals also should continually work to broaden their understanding of all things non-fish in nature; learn those birds and plants,

become familiar with aquatic insect identification and taxonomy, and continually display a curiosity for the natural world. In a nutshell, never stop wondering and learning.
