

Jack Bayless Award for Best Professional Paper Dr. George R. Sedberry, South Carolina DNR

Dr. George Sedberry was announced as the winner of the 2007 Bayless Award at our Annual Meeting on February 4, 2008 at Santee State Park, SC. The award was for Dr Sedberry's presentation "Spawning of black grouper (*Mycteroperca bonaci*) in Belize" (co-author: Mito Paz) which he presented on January 24, 2007 at the SC-AFS annual meeting in Tybee Island, Georgia.

The Bayless Award was created in honor of Jack D. Bayless, to recognize the best South Carolina presentation/paper given at each annual chapter meeting. Each year, volunteer judges evaluate presentations in the following categories:

- Significance to aquaculture and fisheries,
- Experimental design and analysis,
- Organization,
- Presentation, and
- Quality of visual aids.

Presenters are scored on a scale of one to four, four being excellent, for each category. The presenter with the highest total score receives the award. Any members interested in volunteering as judges for the next annual meeting, or joining the Awards Committee, should contact SC-AFS President or President-elect.

Conservationist of the Year Award

Dr. Victor Burrell Jr. was named 2007 Conservationist of the Year at the annual meeting of the SC-AFS this year. This is the most prestigious award bestowed by the SC–AFS Chapter and it recognizes outstanding contributions in the conservation of South Carolina fishery resources.

Dr. Burrell served as director of the Marine Resources Research Institute from 1972 until his retirement in 1990. Though in retirement, Dr. Burrell still spends time conserving natural resources. He is actively working on a paper to document SC's historical blue crab fishery. In addition to his numerous scientific publications, Dr. Burrell has already documented SC's historical oyster industry in a book in which he provides the reader with unique anecdotal information from the fishermen themselves. No one else could have brought this important economic aspect of SC history to life and to the page as effectively as Dr. Burrell. Over the last 35 years in Charleston, Dr. Burrell has initiated, conducted and directed research focused primarily on the conservation of marine and estuarine species and habitats important to South Carolina. During that time, he produced an exhaustive list of scientific papers and presentations. To ensure the conservation and protection of biological resources of the marine environment during any exploration and production of oil and minerals, Dr. Burrell served for many years on the Bureau of Minerals Management Outer Continental Shelf Policy Committee. Also in the spirit of conservation, Dr. Burrell was one of the founding members of the South Carolina Aquarium and continues on its board of directors. Dr. Burrell has served president of the National Shellfish Association and the Estuarine Research Society,

which named him an honorary live member. He also served as president of the College of Charleston Alumni Association and was honored as the college's alumnus of the year. In addition, Dr. Burrell is listed in Community Leaders of America, Personalities of the South, American Men and Women of Science, the International Directory of Distinguished Leadership, Who's Who in the south and southwest, and Men of Achievement.

Research Reports From our Membership

Sturgeon Sampling in Winyah Bay and Edisto River

ENTRIX, Inc (Dr. Anna Toline, Leo Lentsch) and SCDNR (Bill Post, Dr. Mark Collins) partnered on the development and implementation of a SC Sea Grant funded project to sample and tag Atlantic sturgeon in Winyah Bay and the Edisto River. This project was designed to utilize the help of individuals who were once commercial sturgeon fishermen. Mr. Ronnie Campbell, Mr. Jr. Jordon and Mr. Ivy Perry were all active participants in the project. Twenty-five fish were captured in Winyah Bay; one was estimated at approximately 200lbs. Two of the fish were recaptures. One of the recaptures was from the Winyah Bay sampling, while one was from elsewhere.

There were 35 Adult Atlantic Sturgeon caught in the Edisto River. Four of the sturgeon were recaptured from past projects, with one of the fish (original capture 1997) having had a radio and sonic tag. sampled both sites were highly-cooperative and responsible. This project allowed fishermen the opportunity to better understand what is involved in sampling and aided in building a cooperative partnership with fishermen, SCDNR and researchers. Additionally, it created on opportunity for knowledge gained by local fishermen to be transferred to sturgeon researchers.
